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CHILD CARE

GOAL 11

The number of quality, affordable, inclusive child care services accessible to parents of children with significant disabilities will increase.

Objective 11.1 The capacity of the Louisiana's child care system to support children with significant disabilities will improve.

Inclusive Child Care Training participated in five collaborative meetings this period including the Professional Development Committee, the System Planning Committee, and the Quality Start Child Care Rating System Committee. The project will focus on making recommendations on how children with disabilities can be supported within Louisiana's new Professional Development System. New inclusive childcare training materials are being developed and existing materials updated. Training and technical assistance will begin in the summer and four webinars will take place over the course of the project.

Information will be gathered regarding recommendations of a special needs rate in the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) through stakeholder meetings scheduled for this Spring. The project is also reviewing quality-rating systems of other states to provide feedback related to Louisiana's Quality Start Child Care Rating System and how it might better support children with disabilities. Work on this committee will focus on how children with disabilities can be supported within Louisiana's new Coordinated Early Childhood System.
