- Contract was effective March 1, 2013.
- The project will develop training and mentoring materials to be used in a curriculum to train 15 Arc BR staff.
- Trainers will begin to develop the skills necessary to train and mentor EarlySteps providers to support children with disabilities.

#### **EMPLOYMENT**

Goal 9 Changes in public policy and practice will result in an increase of 1,000 people with developmental disabilities in integrated individualized employment.

Objective 9.1 Louisiana will develop and implement an Employment First plan.

#### Activity 9.1.1 Advocate for

- policies that incentivize services for individualized integrated. competitive employment and dis-incentivize segregated, sheltered day habilitation services.
- sheltered workshops to transition people into individualized, competitive, paid employment and discontinue admissions into segregated day programs,
- collaborative policy making and practices across state agencies that promote students being supported in and transitioning into competitive paid employment,
- implementation of ongoing multiagency employment data collection, management and analysis.
- LRS and OCDD will collaborate to mandate that all supported employment vendors/providers complete a university-based 40 hour training.

<b>Progress:</b> Council staff participates in OCDD's Employment First Workgroup with several
other parent, advocate, and agency members.
• The group met January 23 for the first time since June and appointed members including
Council staff to a Data Committee and a Rate Committee to develop specific
recommendations.

**Progress:** The Council collaborates with other groups such as the Louisiana Rehabilitation Council which reports progress on educating legislators on the issues surrounding LRS' budget and drawdown.

- The Council wrote a letter of support to the Commissioner of Administration on Sept. 27<sup>th</sup> in support of fully funding the necessary state match to draw down LA's federal allotment.
- This issue was presented at 11 legislative roundtables across the state and fact sheets on this topic are being given to legislators at every LaCAN legislative visit.

Activity 9.4.1 Provide financial support to conduct a media campaign to educate employers, individuals with disabilities, family members, and provider agencies about the benefits of having people with developmental disabilities as part of the community-based workforce.

Activity 11.1.1 Provide funding to the Arc of Baton Rouge to increase the capacity of child care centers statewide regarding inclusion to accept children with developmental disabilities.

Approximate Cost: \$32,500 in FFY 2012

**The Inclusive Child Care Training** provided direct on-site technical assistance on three occasions to teachers, aides, and a director of a child care center in Region 2.

- Project staff has requested to be part of the Department of Children and Family Services workgroup exploring the restructuring of the Child Care Assistance Program to impact the special needs rate.
- Project staff participated in Bright Start activities, providing feedback on the state's plan
  presented by the Department of Education on the new rating system to support inclusion
  of children with disabilities.

- Project staff reviewed current training modules needing revisions to align with the state's Early Childhood Redesign and also the current technical assistance protocol used for Child Care Resource and Referral agencies to request technical assistance for children with disabilities.
- The Department of Education did include the feedback previously provided to the Bright Start survey and reiterated at the BESE meeting their intent to implement recommendations submitted by the project.
