Dear Representative Schroder,

Thank you for your letter regarding the implementation of Act 833 of the 2014 Regular Session. This new law offers important opportunities for thousands of Louisiana students. It also has significant implications for the work of IEP teams and local school systems. I share your commitment to ensuring that the law serves the students of our state.

The Department and BESE have focused on three major activities related to this legislation. Immediately after the law was signed into effect, the Department began working with the special education advocacy community to develop the BESE policy that would guide district implementation. Following input by the Special Education Advisory Panel and other stakeholders, BESE approved the revisions to Bulletin 1530 on August 13 at the first available meeting after the bill signing.

Since that time, the Department has shifted its focus to developing guidance for IEP teams on how to implement this bill using strong IEP goals and clear expectations for student outcomes. I have attached a timeline to this letter including the steps BESE and LDE have already taken and the expected dates for forthcoming resources and information.

The thirty-day requirement for IEP teams to establish student performance requirements is spelled out explicitly in the law and, being part of a state statute, cannot be waived by BESE or the Department. However, recognizing that this first year of implementation requires a large shift by school systems and IEP teams, the Department will not collect information related to the implementation of Act 833 until the second semester of the 2014-2015 school year. We believe this will provide IEP teams and district staff ample time to digest and carry out their new responsibilities.

While Act 833 is a voluminous law, the work to implement its provisions is well underway. My team and I are committed to supporting school districts as they carry out their new responsibilities. Thank you for your continued dedication to Louisiana's students.

Act 833 of the 2014 Legislative Session

Act 833 of the 2014 Legislative Session provides for alternate pathways for certain students with disabilities to be promoted and graduate with a diploma. The new law increases the responsibilities of IEP teams and includes additional decision points and timelines for their work.

Act 833 Directives to the LDOE and BESE

The law requires BESE to amend the current IEP team regulations to align with the new responsibilities. BESE must also provide guidance to IEPs teams for establishing minimum score requirements, however, IEP teams are explicitly not required to use these materials. The Act directs the LDE, to the extent possible, to track the performance of students with disabilities affected by the law and address concerns identified throughout the monitoring process.

BESE and DOE Commitments

Act 833 has significant implications and impacts tens of thousands of Louisiana students and cannot be implemented successfully in a short period of time. Immediately after the new law became effective, the LDOE informed school districts of the new requirements and began to draft BESE regulations, in consultation with the advocacy community, to place the new requirements and the student eligibility criteria into policy. Since the passage of the policy at the August BESE meeting, the LDOE has been developing guidance for LEAs and IEP teams on how to implement the new rules using IEPs that set students and teachers up for success. The LDOE plans to release this guidance in late September, yet discussions with LEAs about successful implementation will continue throughout the school year. The timeline listed below provides steps BESE and the LDOE have taken thus far to implement Act 833, in addition to expected dates for forthcoming resources and conversations.
